TERMINATION OF STATE OF EMERGENCY CAMDEN COUNTY, NC

WHEREAS, pursuant to General Statute 166A-19.22, a local State of Emergency can be implemented when a natural/man-made disaster or public health emergency is approaching or has affected an area to ensure resources, supplies, and personnel are easily accessible to aid in the emergency response during an event. Pursuant to General Statute 166A-19.31, a local State of Emergency can also include local restrictions and prohibitions to ensure the safety of the public; and

WHEREAS, the local State of Emergency was put into effect on March 17, 2020 without restrictions or prohibitions for the COVID-19 pandemic to aid in receiving supplies, additional personnel, and other resources necessary to assist with the Public Safety response to COVID-related emergencies in our area of responsibility; and

WHEREAS, with the introduction of the COVID vaccines in our jurisdictions in January 2021 through Albemarle Regional Health Services and a State-sponsored clinic at Elizabeth City State University along with the public's adherence to the State restrictions, we are able to move from a response phase to a recovery phase; and

WHEREAS, although our local State of Emergency for COVID-19 will be ending, the Executive Orders enacted by Governor Roy Cooper remain in effect and enforceable throughout the State of NC. Therefore, all residents will need to continue to follow the latest guidance and restrictions as set forth in the Executive Orders such as wearing masks/face coverings, social distancing, restrictions on mass gatherings, restrictions on occupancy for businesses, etc. Additional information on restrictions and updated Executive Orders can be obtained from the following:

Item Title: Application for Zoning Map Amendment from Avery Family Rev. Trust

Summary:

Avery Family Rev. Trust has requested a map amendment for approximately 52 acres from Planned Development (PD) and 37 acres from Working Lands to Suburban Residential (SR). Both parcels are located off One Mill Rd and Riggs Rd in the Shiloh Township.

The neighborhood meeting was held on December 9, 2020. On January 20, 2021, the Planning Board recommends approval of the rezoning request with a 6-0 vote.

The proposed zoning change is inconsistent with the CAMA Future Land Use Map. The CAMA Future Land Use Maps has the majority of property identified as Conservation.

The proposed zoning change is consistent with the County's Comprehensive Future Land Use Map which shows the current Planned Development Zoning Parcel to be Village Mixed Use.

A Public Hearing was held at the April 5, 2021 Regular Meeting of the Board of Commissioners. The Board voted 5-0 to table a decision until the May 3, 2021 Regular Meeting.

Recommendations:

Motion to approve Consistency Statement:

The requested zoning change is consistent with Comprehensive Future Land Use Maps that reflect allowing higher density residential development in targeted areas of the County. The requested zoning change is inconsistent with the CAMA Future Land Use Plan which identifies the majority of the property as Conservation.

If rezoning is approved CAMA requires an approval of a Resolution to the CAMA Future Land Use Map.

Motion to approve:

Motion to approve the Ordinance 2021-03-01/Rezoning Application (UDO 2020-12-14) for the two parcels of property, approximately 52 acres and 37 acres from Planned Development (PD), Working Lands (WL) and a Rural Residential (RR); to Suburban Residential (SR); and to approve the resolution amending CAMA Future Land Use Map.

Reasonableness Statement for approval:

The requested rezoning is consistent with 2035 Comprehensive Future Land Use Plan and is supported in the 2005 CAMA Land Use Plan policy: "P.3 - Camden County supports the frequency of shoreline access as defined by 15A NCAC 7M, Section .0300, Shorefront Access Policies. However, emphasis will be placed on providing access to the Great Dismal Swamp and the Shiloh Township area."

Motion for denial:

Motion to deny the Ordinance 2021-03-01/Rezoning Application (UDO 2020-12-14) for the two parcels of property, approximately 52 acres and 37 acres from Planned Development (PD), Working Lands (WL) and a Rural Residential (RR) to Suburban Residential (SR).

Reasonableness Statement for denial:

The requested zoning change is inconsistent with the CAMA Future Land Use Plan which identifies the majority of the property as Conservation.

REQUEST: Zoning Map Amendment from Planned Development, Working Lands, and Rural Residential to Suburban Residential.

Rezone two parcels; first parcel 03-8971-00-30-0834-0000 of approximately 52 acres from Planned Development (PD) and second parcel 03-8971-00-21-2552-0000 of approximately 37 acres from Working Lands (WL) and a Rural Residential fragment (RR) to Suburban Residential (SR). All parcels are located off One Mill Rd and Riggs Rd in the Shiloh Township.

Rezoning from the following Zoning District: Planned Development (PD) Purpose Statement (Article 151.3.6.3)

The Planned Development (PD) district is established and intended to encourage innovative land planning and site design concepts that support a high quality of life and achieve a high quality of development, environmental sensitivity, energy efficiency, and other County goals and objectives by:

- Reducing or diminishing inflexibility or uniform design that sometimes results from the strict application of zoning and development standards designed primarily for individual lots;
- Allowing greater freedom in selecting the means of providing access, open space, and design amenities;
- Allowing greater freedom in providing a well-integrated mix of residential and nonresidential land uses in the same development, including a mix of housing types, lot sizes, and densities;
- Providing for efficient use of land resulting in smaller networks of utilities and streets and thereby lowering development and housing costs; and
- Promoting quality design and environmentally sensitive development that respects surrounding established land use character and respects and takes advantage of a site's natural and man-made features, such as trees, estuaries, shorelines, special flood hazard area, and historic features.

Working Lands (WL) Purpose Statement Article 151.3.5.2)

The Working Lands (WL) district is established to accommodate agriculture, agriculturally-related uses, and limited forms residential development at very low densities in rural portions of the County. The district is primarily intended to preserve and protect bona fide farms and resource lands for current or future agricultural use as well as to protect the rural character of the area. One of the primary tools for character protection is the requirement to configure residential subdivisions of more than five lots as conservation subdivisions. The conservation subdivision approach seeks to minimize the visibility of new residential development from adjacent roadways through proper placement and screening, and allows farmers to capture a portion of the land's development potential while continuing to farm. Conservation subdivisions allow a portion of a tract or site to be developed with single-family detached homes while the balance of the site is left as conservation or agricultural land. The district also accommodates a wide range of agricultural and agricultural-related uses like "agri-tourism" as well as service and support uses to the rural community, including day care, educational uses, public safety facilities, parks, and utility features.

Rezoning to the following Zoning District: Suburban Residential (SR) Purpose Statement (Article 151.3.5.5)

The Suburban Residential (SR) district is the County's primary district for suburban residential neighborhoods located along primary roadways, shoreline areas, and in locations bordering rural areas. The district has a one-acre minimum lot area requirement, which is the basic threshold size for lots with on-site wastewater systems. Use of the conservation subdivision configuration is optional for residential subdivisions. While the district allows single-family detached homes, mobile homes on individual lots are prohibited. Nonconforming mobile homes may remain but may not be expanded or replaced with another mobile home. The district accommodates equestrian uses, utilities, as well as various neighborhood-supporting institutional uses such as parks, schools, and public safety facilities. District regulations discourage uses that interfere with the development of residential neighborhoods or that are detrimental to the suburban nature of the district

SPECIFIC CAMA LAND USE QUESTIONS TO CONSIDER:

1. <u>Does Camden County need more land in the zoning class requested?</u>

In Camden County 0.63% is zoned as Planned Development, 72.95% is zoned as Working Lands and 1.79% of the property is zoned as Suburban Residential.

2. <u>Is there other land in the county that would be more appropriate for the proposed uses?</u> There is very limited waterfront property left to be developed.

3. Is the entire range of permitted uses in the requested classification more appropriate than the range of uses in the existing classification?

The range of uses between Planned Development, Working Lands and Suburban Residential are similar. Planned Development may allow for commercial development not allowed in other two districts and the proposed density is established upon approval of Masterplan. Suburban Residential allows for higher density than Working Lands. The Zoning Comparison, included in the package, identifies specific uses for each zoning district.

4. Will the request have serious impact on traffic circulation, parking space, sewer and water services, other utilities?

The proposed zoning uses will have an impact on all public facilities. The Preliminary Plat Application will require a Development Impact Statement. The Development Impact Statement is determined by the Physical Analysis, Housing Market Analysis Water Analysis, Sewer Analysis, Fiscal Analysis and Traffic Analysis.

5. Will the request have an impact on other county services, including police protection, fire protection or the school system?

The proposed zoning uses will have an impact on all public services. The specific service and to what extent the impact will be projected during the development approval process of the property, using recommendations from the Technical Review Committee.

6. <u>Is there a good possibility that the request, as proposed, will result, as proposed, will result in lessening the enjoyment or use of adjacent properties?</u>

All permitted uses in the requested zoning classification should not lessen the enjoyment or use of any adjacent properties.

7. Will the request, as proposed cause serious noise, odors, light, activity, or unusual disturbances?

All uses permitted in the requested zoning classification should not cause any serious noise, odors, light activity, or unusual disturbances.

8. Does the request raise serious legal questions such as spot zoning, hardship, violation of precedents, or need for this type of use?

The request does not raise serious legal questions.

9. Does the request impact any CAMA Areas of Environmental Concern?

Yes the proposed development includes areas of environmental concern. Concerns are flood zone AE, wetlands, and the waterfront. The development process will include the required documentation for Federal, State and County; (CAMA permit, NCDEQ Erosion & Sediment Control permit, NCDEQ Stormwater permit, Approved County drainage plan, and any other appropriate approvals.)

Recommendations:

Planning Staff recommends approval of the Rezoning Application (UDO 2020- 12-14) of the Avery parcels on One Mill Rd and Riggs Road from Planned Development, Working Lands, and Rural Residential to Suburban Residential. This recommendation is based on the 2035 Comprehensive Plan which identifies: (1) 52 acres as Village Mixed Use with an appropriate specific use as moderate and higher density residential uses (up to 14 dwellings units per acre); (2) 37 acres as Rural Preservation with appropriate uses of farms and forestry sites.

 Down grading of the current PUD zoning for the northern parcel to Suburban Residential will greatly reduce the amount of residential density while the rezoning of the southern parcel from Working Lands to Suburban Residential, will provide continuity with the adjacent residential pockets along One Mill Road and Avery Drive. The combination of reduced density, potential for conservation areas and the development of shoreline property, will contribute to a lower impact development with less demand on infrastructure while highlighting higher valued property.

In keeping with the Suburban Residential zone's Purpose Statement, primary placement of such neighborhoods is to be along areas such as primary roads, shoreline area and bordering on rural areas. COMMUNITY MEETING REPORT FOR AVERY FAMILY TURST

Project: Rezoning 88.8-Acres on Riggs Road
Facilitator: Jason Mizelle – Timmons Group
Date & Time: December 9, 2020 @ 6:00 PM
Location: Historic Camden Court House

In preparation for the Community Meeting, eighteen notices were mailed out notifying the adjoining property owners & the County Staff about the meeting. Five Camden residents attended, most of whom resided along the One Mill Road side of the project. Also, in attendance were Amber Curling of the Camden County Planning Department, Steve Bradshaw & Preston Avery (applicants) as well as Jason Mizelle of Timmons Group.

I opened the meeting with an explanation of the rezoning process and what specifically the applicants were looking to do with the property, if approved. Having the meeting early in the review process gives the developer and the design professionals time to analyze comments, address concerns and possibly make changes. I explained that we were at the very beginning of the process and there was a long way to go in order to see a project like this to fruition.

Steve Bradshaw, one of the applicants, then reviewed in detail the thought process behind the type of development being sought and why the change from the PUD & Working Lands designations to Suburban Residential was more befitting of the property and its proximity to the water.

Much of the question and answers with those in attendance centered around the timing of the project and when construction might commence. It was relayed that the project would likely not start construction for a year and even then it would be phased construction.

Other items discussed were in relation to some of the current property use encroachments of the residences along One Mill Road and that it was the applicants desire to convey that portion of the parcel that would make up the area in use, so as to have those residents not have to relocate or modify any improvements made. It was explained that the sliver of land in question was not being included in our project limits or calculations.

Mr. Bradshaw reviewed the concept plan in further detail to highlight the areas adjacent to the residents in attendance parcels and to discuss the hopes that the inclusion of canal connections to the river would aid in some of the drainage woes that were currently occurring in that area.

The meeting was concluded at 7:00 pm as there were no further questions or discussion.

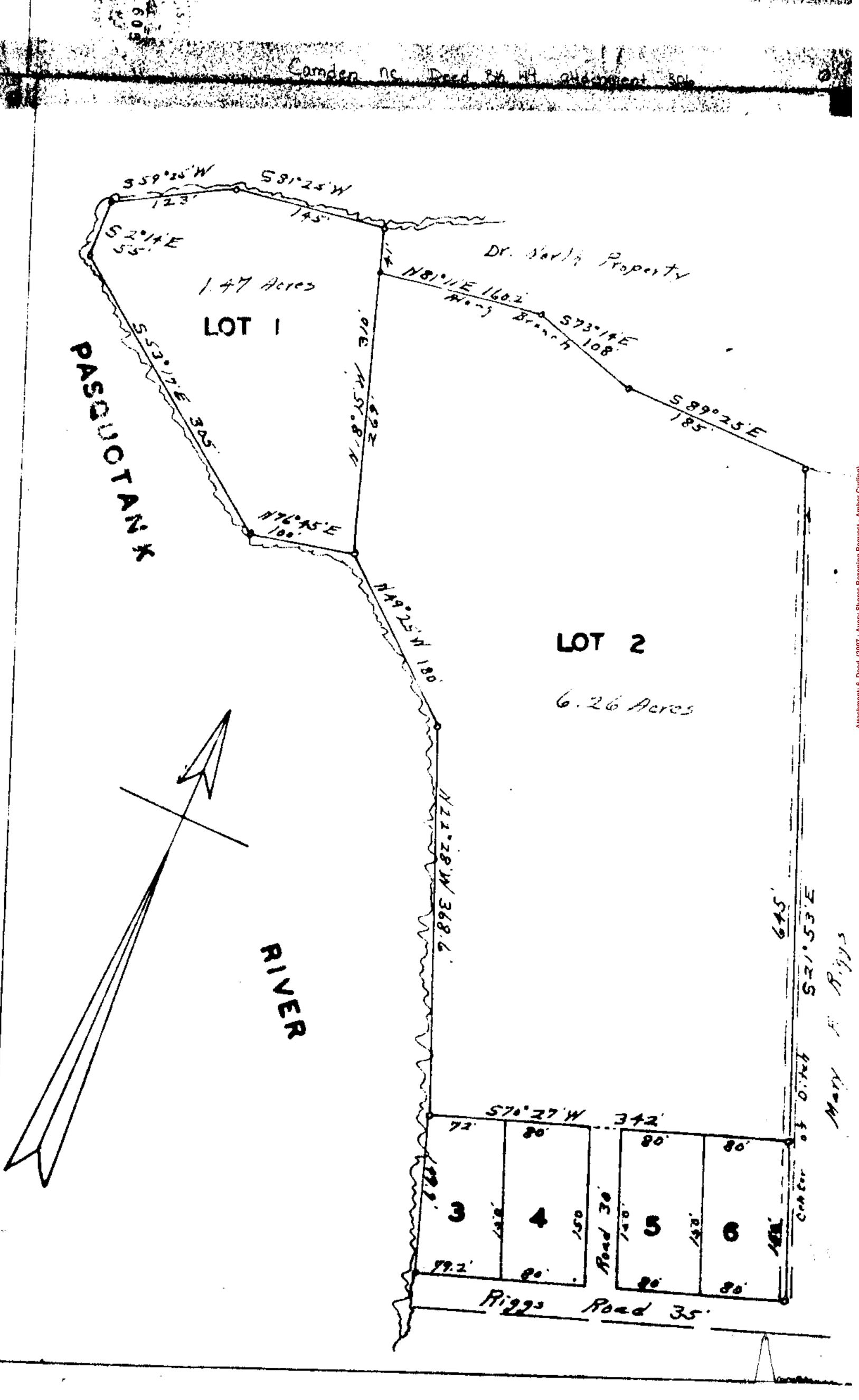



AUTHORIZING AN AMENDMENT TO THE COASTAL AREA MANAGEMENT AGENCY CORE LAND USE PLAN

WHEREAS, the County desires to amend its 2005 CAMA Core Land Use Plan, specifically the Future Land Use Map, to designate approximately 82 acres of the Future Land Use Map from Conservation, to 82 acres to Low Density Residential to accommodate a rezoning request from Planned Development (PD), Working Lands (WL) and Rural Residential (RR) to Suburban Residential (SR) for development of a waterfront residential development; (Exhibit 1) and

WHEREAS, on January 21, 2021 the Planning Board unanimously recommended rezoning and related adoption of the draft amendment to the CAMA Core Land Use Plan; and

WHEREAS, the County conducted a duly advertised public hearing on the draft amendment to the CAMA Core Land Use Plan at the Regular Meeting of the Board of Commissioners on April 5, 2021; and

WHEREAS, the amendment to the Future Land Use Map has been evaluated for its consistency with other existing policies and no internal inconsistencies exist; and

WHEREAS, the amendment is consistent with the currently approved North Carolina Coastal Management Program and the rules of the Coastal Resources Commission; and

WHEREAS, a review of the Implementation Policies indicates that this project and request is consistent with 25 of the Land Use Policies – specifically Policy 3 "Camden County supports the frequency of shoreline access as defined by 15A NCAC 7M, Section .0300, Shorefront Access Policies. However, emphasis will be placed on providing access to the Great Dismal Swamp and the Shiloh Township area."; and

Ordinance No. 2021-03-01

An Ordinance Amending the Camden County Zoning Map Camden County, North Carolina

Article I: Purpose

The purpose of this Ordinance is to amend the Zoning Map of Camden County, North Carolina, which was originally adopted by the County Commissioners on December 20, 1993, and revised February 4, 2019 and subsequently amended.

Article II. Amendment to Zoning Map

The Official Zoning Map of Camden County, North Carolina, which was adopted on December 20, 1993, and revised February 4, 2019 and subsequently amended, is hereby amended as follows:

The parcels of property currently shown in the Camden County Tax Assessor's Office as PIN 03-8971-00-30-0834-0000 of approximately 52 acres from Planned Development (PD) and 03-8971-00-21-2552-0000, of approximately 37 acres from Working Lands (WL) and a Rural Residential (RR) to Suburban Residential (SR).

Article III. Penalty

- 1. Violations of the provision of this Ordinance or failure to comply with any of its Requirements, including violations of any conditions and safeguards established in connection with grants of variances or Special Use or Conditional Use Permits, shall constitute a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of up to five-hundred (\$500) dollars or a maximum thirty (30) days imprisonment as provided in G. S. 14-4.
- 2. Any act constituting a violation of the provisions of this Ordinance or a failure to comply with any of its requirements, including violations of any conditions and safeguards established in connection with the grants of variances or Special Use or Conditional Use Permits, shall also subject the offender to a civil penalty of one-hundred (\$100) dollars for each day the violation continues. If the offender fails to pay the penalty within ten (10) days after being cited for a violation, the penalty may be recovered by the county in a civil action in the nature of debt. A civil penalty may not be appealed to the Board of

Adjustment if the offender was sent a final notice of violation in accordance with Article 151.568 and did not take an appeal to the Board of Adjustment within the prescribed time.

- 3. This Ordinance may also be enforced by any appropriate equitable action.
- 4. Each day that any violation continues after notification by the administrator that such violation exists shall be considered a separate offense for purposes of the penalties and remedies specified in this section.
- 5. Any one, all or any combination of the foregoing penalties and remedies may be used to enforce this Ordinance.

Article IV. Severability

If any language in this Ordinance is found to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction or other entity having such legal authority, then only the specific language held to be invalid shall be affected and all other language shall be in full force and effect.

Article V. Effective Date

This Ordinance is effective upon adoption.

MINUTES

A Regular Meeting of the Camden County Board of Commissioners was held on April 5, 2021 in the Historic Courtroom, Camden, North Carolina.

CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Tom White at 7:00 PM. Also Present: Vice Chairman Ross Munro, Commissioners Clayton Riggs, Randy Krainiak, Tiffney White; County Manager Ken Bowman, and Clerk to the Board Karen Davis.

INVOCATION & PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Pastor Bill Blake gave the invocation and the Board led in the Pledge of Allegiance.

ITEM 1. PUBLIC COMMENTS

The following addressed the Board with concerns in regard to the Camden Bears Youth Football League:

Britton Overton, longtime resident of Camden and Director of Transportation for Camden County Schools included the following in his remarks:

- His experience with the DHHS restrictions and recommendations in regard to COVID-19 due to his position.
- Disappointment with the Parks & Recreation Department in regard to the Camden Bears Youth Football League and the fact that the Parks & Recreation Advisory Board is unaware of the situation.
- Parks & Recreation Department web site has little to no information.
- No sports have been offered by the Parks & Recreation Department during COVID.
- No effort from the Parks & Recreation Department to overcome the challenges presented by COVID-19.
- Will follow up with an email to the Commissioners, County Manager and Tim White and will appreciate a response.

Jennifer White, Camden resident and parent, included the following in her remarks:

- Has dealt with the many challenges associated with COVID in her workplace, but it's time to move forward.
- The children should be given the opportunity to play football in Camden.

Christopher Sparks, South Mills Resident and parent, included the following in his remarks:

- It is hurtful that the team is not allowed to practice on the field and has to go elsewhere to practice.
- Requested support from the Commissioners for the team leaders and players.

Marcus White, Camden citizen and coach, included the following in his remarks:

- Encourages his children to take advantage of activities offered throughout the community.
- For those playing soccer, there are no questions concerning residence, practice times, location of games; not so with football.
- Referenced the Memorandum of Understanding between the Parks & Recreation Department and Board of Education. Mrs. White assists with the program and provided the information requested, including insurance and rosters. The League provided what was required in the MOU and still were not allowed to practice on the field.
- There are no instructions on how to apply for a Category 4 permit and Mr. White requested feedback on how to do so.

Tiffany Cuevas, Camden citizen and parent, included the following in her remarks:

- The importance of the opportunity for the children to get outside and play sports due to video games and remote learning.
- The importance of the social and physical aspects of being involved in sports.

Commissioner Riggs questioned the Memorandum of Understanding and what had changed.

Mr. Overton explained that there were COVID issues in the fall that prevented the team from playing and that many of the guidelines and restrictions have changed. He was told by Parks & Recreation Director Tim White that the Camden Bears could not use the field because the Albemarle Youth League, which is who sanctions the area youth sports, was not having a Spring league. Only 2 organizations were able to put together teams – Pasquotank and Camden. Mr. Overton questioned why once the insurance issue was corrected the team was still not allowed to play. Other Tier III organizations are using the facilities that are outside of Camden and Pasquotank. He feels as though the football program was targeted in this situation.

Chairman Tom White stated that the matter will be reviewed.

Nicholas Rhodes, Camden resident and Director of the Camden Bears Youth Football League addressed the Board. It was his intent to start conditioning in the summer prior to the start of the season. After a conversation with Tim White, they began taking temperatures and wearing masks. Due to the Governor's mandate, conditioning practices were shut down. When the team began conditioning again they were shut down by the Parks & Recreation Department due to the players having contact. The team started again in February and was shut down again because of "contact" between the players. Proof of insurance and nonprofit status was provided and the league continued to be shut down. The League was given a field in Elizabeth City on which to practice and the League is now a part of the Hampton Football League in Virginia with no issues. The desire is for the league to have the opportunity to practice at their own facility here in Camden.

Felicia White, Camden resident and parent, has been helping Mr. Rhodes with the program. On March 9th, Mrs. White had a telephone conversation with Tim White in which Mr. White informed her that the League would no longer be able to use the facility as he was in the possession of a 27-second video, taken by a Camden County employee in the parking lot, that shows contact between the players. She stated that was not possible because she was present the entire practice. She requested to see the video and was refused. Her husband, a football coach, has instructed the players on drills that can be practiced safely. Camden County youth are now required to practice in Elizabeth City and should be allowed to play in their home county. In her observation, soccer games and practices are continuing with no masks or distancing.

ITEM 4. PRESENTATIONS

A. Camden Sheriff's Office - Brandon Blount announced the Firehouse Subs grant award to the Sheriff's Office of 10 new AED's. Every vehicle with the Sheriff's Office is now equipped with an AED. The Sheriff's Office also recently received a radar/message sign which it acquired through a contest sponsored by All Traffic Solutions at no expense to the County.

B. Animal Ordinance Amendment Request – Ms. Cam Smart presented the following request to amend the County Animal Ordinance.

Change Camden County Animal Ordinance for public safety

by providing a distinction between domestic dogs and wolf-hybrids

Overview: Within the current ordinance, Camden County does not make a distinction between domestic dogs and wolf-hybrids. This is dangerous to the citizens and visitors of the County as the current ordinance allows domestic dogs an unleashed freedom. At least twenty-seven counties, including Guilford (cited in Attachment A), have adopted additional language within their ordinance to define and prohibit inherently dangerous animals. At least twenty counties, including Forsyth (cited in Attachment A), have also incorporated language for wild and/or exotic animals.

Supporting Facts:

1. Wolf-Hybrids are Inherently Dangerous

Wolf-Hybrids grow up to be wolves, not dogs. National Wildlife Federation

"Finally, there is the concern that including wolf and wolf-crosses in the definition of dog sends a misleading message that wolves and wolf-dog crosses are safe as house pets, when, in actuality, such animals can be highly unpredictable and can have dangerous, instinctive wild behaviors." American Veterinary Medical Association

"The offspring of wild animals crossbred to domestic dogs and cats (wild animal hybrids) are considered wild animals by the National Association of State and Public Health Veterinarians (NASPHV) and the Council of State and Territorial Epidemiologists." CDC

"It's clear from all statistics that wolf-dog hybrids present a severely heightened risk for infants and young children." Alexandra Semyonova, animal behaviorist, an analytical paper

Summary, Section 1: Wolf-Hybrids are wild animals that present our worst fear - A predator that is not afraid of humans.

2. Spread of Rabies

There is no rabies vaccine for wolf-hybrids. CDC, AMVA

The USDA withdraws proposal for wolf-hybrid rabies vaccine, creates distinction between domestic dog and wolf-hybrid. Federal Register

Rabies is a virus. Though a bite is most common, it is the wet saliva that contains the virus. It can be spread through contact of wet saliva to the eyes, nose, mouth and, within closer proximity, by aerosol spray. CDC

Human-to-human transmission through bites or saliva is theoretically possible but has never been confirmed.** The same applies for transmission to humans via consumption of raw meat or milk of infected animals. WHO

** The incubation period for rabies is typically 2–3 months but may vary from 1 week to 1 year (WHO), allowing the virus to spread asymptomatically. Mammals may have the rabies virus in their saliva and may be able to transmit it for a short period of time before clinical signs appear. Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

Rabies is a viral RNA CDC, just like Covid.

Rabies virus survives death of animal. Science Direct

"Because the hunter dressed the deer with scratches on his hands game officials said, he inadvertently provided an entry point for the virus." Pennsylvania Game Commission article

Summary, **Section 2:** Rabies can be transmitted asymptomatically and is fatal. With no vaccination for the wolf-hybrid, Camden County's rural nature provides quick, ample opportunity for the spread of rabies.

3. Imminent Threat, case in point

Leaseholder at 141 Edgewater Dr, Shiloh has caged up to seven wolves or wolf-hybrids, along with domestic dogs on the property. The leaseholder has no license to breed, kennel, or sell wolves or wolf-hybrids, and is not a resident of the County.

Concrete should extend two feet into the ground. Wolf-dog recommendations, Gray Wolf Conservation

All entrances and exits must have double gates. <u>Wolf-dog recommendations</u>, <u>Gray Wolf Conservation</u>

An absentee caretaker does not have an emergency plan.

Danger to Citizenry will Increase

Leaseholder has kept more than 100 animals, including exotics, cited for violating ordinance in Virginia. The Virginia Pilot

Leaseholder has kept more than 200 animals, rains destroyed enclosure. 13News

Leaseholder is actively breeding wolf-hybrids in Camden County.

Complaints

Local authorities have received numerous visits, phone calls, and documented complaints for animal welfare, noise levels, the rank smell from unsanitary conditions, and fear for family and pet safety. Previous locations of Leaseholder have also incurred complaints from neighbors citing safety and animal waste as concerns.

Summary, Section 3. The leaseholder absorbs County resources and is knowingly in violation of state and local laws, disregards best practices, resides outside of Camden County and, through these non-resident, non-compliant, unregulated actions put Camden County citizens directly in the line of danger and increased risk for rabies, attacks, and other inherently dangerous animal events.

Conclusion: For the safety of our residents, visitors, and pets, make a distinction between domestic dogs and wolf-hybrids. Adopt the proposed changes to Camden County Animal Ordinance based on precedent established by other County Commissioners within North Carolina. Please see Attachment A.

Requested Modifications to Camden County Animal Ordinance

§ 93.01 DUTIES OF ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER.

The Animal Control Officer shall be charged with the responsibility of the following:

- (A) Enforcing in the county all state or county laws, ordinances, and resolutions, relating to animals or to the care, custody, and control of animals;
- (B) Cooperating with the Health Director and assisting in the enforcement of the laws of North Carolina with regard to animals and especially with regard to dogs and cats and the confinement or leashing of vicious and destructive animals;
- (C) Making such canvases of the county as he or she deems necessary to ascertain that all animals are duly and properly listed for tax purposes; and
- (D) Operating pursuant to the policies of the Board of County Commissioners of the county. (Ord. 2001-6-1, passed 6-4-01)

§ 93.02 DEFINITIONS.

For the purpose of this chapter, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning.

ANIMAL CONTROL FACILITY or ANIMAL SHELTER. The animal shelter in Elizabeth City now or formerly operated by the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals of Northeastern North Carolina or any other facility so designated in writing by the County Board of Commissioners.

ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER. The Sheriff of Camden County and any deputy of the Sheriffs of Camden County.

ANIMALS WHICH ARE A PUBLIC NUISANCE. Any animal that unreasonably annoys humans, endangers the life or health of persons or other animals, or substantially interferes with the rights of citizens, other than their owners, to enjoyment of life or property. The terms ANIMALS WHICH ARE A PUBLIC NUISANCE or PUBLIC NUISANCE ANIMAL shall include, but not be limited to:

- (1) Any animal that damages any property other than that of its owner.
- (2) Any animal that makes disturbing noises, including but not limited to, continued and repeated howling, barking, whining, or other utterances causing unreasonable annoyance, disturbance, or discomfort to reasonable persons of ordinary sensibilities in close proximity to the premises where the animal is kept or harbored.
- (3) Any animal in heat that is not confined so as to prevent attraction or contact with other animals as more particularly set forth in G.S. § 67-2.
- (4) Any animal, whether or not on the property of its owner, that without provocation, molests, attacks or otherwise interferes with the freedom of movement of persons in a public right-of-way.
 - (5) Any animal that chases motor vehicles in a public right-of-way.
 - (6) Any animal that attacks domestic animals.

CAMDEN COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT. The Camden County Health Department shall be Albemarle Regional Health Services or other health department so designated in writing by the Camden County Board of Commissioners.

OWNER. Any person, group of persons, firm, partnership or corporation owning, keeping, having charge of, sheltering, feeding, harboring or taking care of any animal. The **OWNER** is responsible for the care, actions, and behavior of vicious and/or destructive animals.

STRAY ANIMALS. Any animal that is wandering at large or lost; not under the immediate control of its owner; appears to be wandering at large; or is not immediately claimed by any person.

VICIOUS ANIMAL.

- (1) Any animal that has made an unprovoked attack on any human whether it be by biting or otherwise; or in any manner caused abrasions or cuts of the skin on a human; or
- (2) One who habitually or repeatedly attacks humans or farm stock, or other animals. (Ord. 2001-6-1, passed 6-4-01; Am. Ord. 2009-07-03, passed 6-6-09; Am. Ord. 2009-09-01, passed 9-8-09)

Insert two definitions (definitions excerpted from Guilford County NC Animal Ordinance)

INHERENTLY DANGEROUS MAMMAL. Any live member of the canidae, felidae or ursidae families, including hybrids thereof, which, due to their inherent nature, may be considered dangerous to humans and which include:

- (1) Canidae, including any member of the dog (canid) family not customarily domesticated by man, or any hybrids thereof, including wolf hybrids which are a cross between a wolf and a domestic dog, but not including domestic dogs (Canis Familiaris).
- (2) Felidae, including any member of the cat family weighing over 15 pounds not customarily domesticated by man, or any hybrids thereof, but not including domestic cats (Felis catus).
- (3) Ursidae, including any member of the bear family, or any hybrids thereof.

EXOTIC OR WILD ANIMAL. An animal that would ordinarily be confined to a zoo; one that would ordinarily be found in the wilderness of this or any other country; one that is a species of animal not indigenous to the United States or to North America; or one that otherwise is likely to cause a reasonable person to be fearful of significant destruction of property or of bodily harm, and the latter includes, but is not limited to, monkeys, raccoons, squirrels, venomous reptiles and other such animals. Such animals are further defined as being those mammals or non-venomous reptiles weighing over 20 pounds at maturity, which are known at law as free nature. Exotic or wild animals specifically do not include animals of a species customarily used in the state as ordinary household pets, animals of a species customarily used in the state as domestic farm animals, fish confined in an aquarium other than piranha, birds, or insects.

§ 93.03 KEEPING FOUND ANIMALS.

It shall be unlawful for any person in the county to harbor, feed, keep in possession by confinement, or otherwise, any animal that does not belong to him or her, without the permission of the owner unless he or she has, within 24 hours from the time the animal came into his or her possession, notified the animal control officer.

(Ord. 2001-6-1, passed 6-4-01) Penalty, see § 93.99

§ 93.04 ANIMALS REQUIRING SPECIAL TAGS.

(A) When any animal has on any occasion been a vicious animal or an animal that is a public nuisance, as defined herein, the owner of the animal shall at all times and in all places, when not directly injurious to the health of the animal, have the animal tagged with a special tag provided by the animal control officer that denotes that the animal is or has been a vicious animal or a public nuisance.

(B) The special tagging may only be removed by the owner and after written authorization by the animal control officer.

(Ord. 2001-6-1, passed 6-4-01)

§ 93.05 RABIES VACCINATION AND CONTROL.

- (A) Every animal which has bitten anyone or which shows symptoms of rabies shall be confined and the facts immediately shall be properly reported to the Animal Control Officer by its owner or person having the animal in charge, and thereupon shall be securely quarantined at the direction of the animal control officer for a period of ten days and shall not be released from the quarantine, except by written permission of the animal control officer.
- (B) The biting animal and its records of vaccination and registration shall be inspected by the animal control officer who will then observe the following policy.
- (1) A properly vaccinated and registered animal may be confined on the owner's premises; provided, however, that an animal control officer determines that the owner has an adequate means of confinement upon his or her own premises and the animal is subject to observation by the officer at any time during the ten-day period.
- (2) (a) An animal not properly vaccinated or registered, belonging to an owner, shall immediately be confined in a veterinary hospital or the county animal shelter, in which case the expense shall be borne by the owner for the ten days of confinement.
 - (b) The animal shall not be vaccinated during confinement.
- (3) A stray animal shall immediately be confined in the county animal shelter or other facility as designated by the animal control officer for a ten-day period.
- (a) Except as provided above, when any animal has bitten a human, it shall be unlawful for the owner of the animal to refuse an investigation by the animal control officer; and the animal control officer shall have the authority to place the animal in supervised quarantine at a place or places of his or her choosing. If rabies does not develop within ten days, the animal may be reclaimed upon full payment to the quarantine facility for the care, feeding or other expenses incurred on behalf of the animal. All reclaim fees charged by the quarantine facility shall be the normal fees charged by the quarantine facility for services rendered. Prior to reclaiming the animal, the owner must have the animal properly vaccinated and, for any dog or cat, shall apply for and pay any license taxes.
- (b) If an animal dies while under observation for rabies, then the head of the animal shall be submitted to the County Health Department for shipment to the State Laboratory of Hygiene for diagnosis.
- (c) It shall be unlawful for any person to kill or release any animal under observation for rabies, any animal suspected of having been exposed to rabies or any animal biting a human, or to remove the animal from the quarantine facility without written permission from the animal control officer.
- (d) The carcass of any dead animal exposed to rabies shall be surrendered to the animal control officer. The head of the animal shall be submitted to the County Health Department for shipment to State Laboratory of Hygiene for diagnosis.
- (e) It shall be unlawful for any person to fail or refuse to surrender any animal for quarantine or destruction as required herein when demand therefore is made orally or in writing by the animal control officer.

§ 93.06 VICIOUS ANIMALS.

- (A) It shall be unlawful for any person to permit his or her animal to run at large if the animal is vicious or has, in the past, been vicious. In such cases, the owner of the animal, or person harboring the animal shall not permit the animal to leave the premises on which it is kept unless it is on a leash.
- (B) In the event of injuries caused by the vicious animal, the animal's owner shall be liable.

(Ord. 2001-6-1, passed 6-4-01) Penalty, see § 93.99

Insert prohibition of Inherently Dangerous Mammals and Wild or Exotic Animals (Prohibition excerpted from Forsyth County NC Animal Ordinance, with nonsubstantive modification for Camden County)

INHERENTLY DANGEROUS MAMMALS AND WILD OR EXOTIC ANIMALS Possession of inherently dangerous mammals and wild or exotic animals is prohibited.

- (A) Unlawful conduct. It shall be unlawful for any person or business entity to possess, harbor or have under their services within the county an inherently dangerous mammal or wild or exotic animal.
- (B) Exemptions from article. Provided that each such animal is maintained in a secure enclosure so constructed and maintained to prevent the animal's escape, this article shall not apply to:
 - (1) Lawfully operated carnivals and circuses.
 - (2) Lawfully operated pet shops.
 - (3) Persons temporarily and lawfully transporting such animals through Camden County, provided that such transit time shall not be more than twenty-four (24) hours.
 - (4) Scientific research laboratories.
 - (5) Veterinary clinics in possession of such animals for medical treatment or rehabilitation purposes.
 - (6) Wildlife rehabilitators with proper permits.
 - (7) GFAS (Global Federation of Animal Sanctuaries) or AZA (Association of Zoos and & Aquariums) accredited or USDA/AWA licensed Zoos.
- (C) Impoundment and disposition of animals.
 - (1) Any inherently dangerous mammal or wild or exotic animal which is kept by any person in contravention of this article may be taken up and impounded by the animal services department, without the necessity of a written order or a court order, for the protection of the public or the health of the animal.
 - (2) If the animal cannot be taken up safely by the animal services department or if proper and safe housing cannot be found for the animal, the department may immediately destroy the animal.

§ 93.07 ANIMALS AS PUBLIC NUISANCES.

- (A) It shall be unlawful for any person to permit his or her animal to run at large if the animal has been a public nuisance animal. In such cases, the owner must keep the animal on his or her property at all times unless the animal is under the control of a competent person.
- (B) It shall be unlawful for any person to keep any animal on any property located within the county when the keeping of the animal constitutes a public nuisance or menace to public health or safety.

(Ord. 2001-6-1, passed 6-4-01) Penalty, see § 93.99

§ 93.08 INJURING ANIMALS; NOTICE REQUIRED.

It shall be unlawful for any person injuring a domestic animal by running over or into the same or coming into contact with the same, with automobile, motorcycle, bicycle or other vehicle, to fail to make a reasonable effort to promptly notify the owner of the injured animal. (Ord. 2001-6-1, passed 6-4-01) Penalty, see § 93.99

§ 93.09 IMPOUNDING ANIMALS; REDEMPTION MATERIAL.

- (A) Any animal which appears to be lost or strayed shall be confined in the animal shelter in a humane manner for a period of not less than five days for redemption by the owner.
- (1) If an impounded animal is not redeemed by the owner within the period, it may be offered for sale to any responsible adult who is willing to comply with these animal control laws and sold to the person first after paying for it as hereinafter provided. If any animal is purchased by any person, that person shall not thereafter sell the animal purchased from the animal shelter for a period of six months. Animals not redeemed within five days after being taken into custody may be sold or destroyed in a humane manner by the animal shelter staff. Selling prices for these animals will be preset by the operator of the animal shelter and will be posted in the office of the shelter.
- (2) Immediately upon impounding an animal, the animal control officer shall make reasonable effort to notify the owner and inform the owner of the conditions whereby the animal may be redeemed.
- (3) Animals impounded which have been bitten by a rabid animal or appear to be suffering from rabies shall not be redeemed or sold, but shall be dealt with as provided hereinabove.
- (4) Any animal that is impounded which is badly wounded, diseased, or which is sick or diseased or poses a health threat to other animals in the animal shelter (not a rabies suspect) and has no identification shall be destroyed immediately in a humane manner. If the animal has identification, the staff of the animal shelter shall attempt to notify the owner before disposing of the animal, but if the owner cannot be reached readily, and so if the animal is suffering or poses a health threat to other animals in the shelter, the staff of the animal shelter may destroy the animal at its discretion in a humane manner.
- (5) The animal control officer or the animal shelter staff may destroy any vicious animal or one that is a public nuisance when it poses a threat to the personal safety of any person.
- (B) When any animal has been impounded at the animal shelter, notice hereof shall be given to the owner. The owner shall be entitled to resume possession of his or her animal, except as already provided for certain animals, upon compliance with the provisions of this chapter and the payment of shelter fees incurred. The redemption fees shall be those normally charged by the animal shelter for care, feeding and other services rendered. No dog or cat may be released unless an application has been submitted and the license tax paid.

 (Ord. 2001-6-1, passed 6-4-01)

§ 93.10 ABANDONMENT OF ANIMALS.

It shall be a violation of this chapter for any person to abandon any animal in the county. (Ord. 2001-6-1, passed 6-4-01) Penalty, see § 93.99

§ 93.11 EXEMPTIONS.

Hospitals, clinics and other premises operated by licensed veterinarians for the care and treatment of animals are exempt from the provision of this chapter. (Ord. 2001-6-1, passed 6-4-01)

§ 93.12 LICENSING OF CATS AND DOGS; FEE.

- (A) (1) There is hereby imposed on a person owning or keeping up to two dogs or four cats a license fee as listed in the Camden County Fee Schedule, on each dog or cat six months of age or older for the privilege of keeping a dog or cat within the county.
- (2) For the purpose of this section, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning.

KENNEL. Any premises wherein a person owns, boards or keeps three or more dogs or five or more cats.

PERSON. Associations, firms, partnerships and bodies politic and corporate, as well as to individuals.

- (3) There is hereby imposed on a person owning or keeping a kennel an annual license fee as listed in the Camden County Fee Schedule, on the kennel for the privilege of keeping a kennel within the county.
- (B) (1) Every person owning or keeping up to two dogs or four cats shall apply to the Sheriff of Camden County for a license for the privilege of keeping a dog or cat six months of age or older within the county or within 30 days after the dog or cat is first kept within the county, whichever comes first. The applicant shall be required to give the name and street address of the person owning or keeping the dog or cat and the name, breed or description, color, age and sex of the dog or cat. The applicant for a license shall be made in writing by the applicant at the Sheriff's Office.
- (2) Every person owning or keeping a kennel, as defined by this section, shall apply annually on or before December 31 to the Sheriff's Office for a license for the privilege of keeping a kennel within the county or within 30 days after a kennel is first kept within the county, and the applicant shall be required to give the name and street address of the person owning or keeping the kennel. The application for the license shall be made in writing by the applicant at the Sheriff's Office.
- (C) The license fee shall be paid at the same time as the application for license is made and the license fee receipt shall constitute the license.
- (D) (1) All dogs and cats kept within the county and on which a license fee is due pursuant hereto shall display a permanent license tag on the dog or cat. The license tag shall be obtained from the Sheriff's Office and the license tag shall continue to be used from year to year. Lost or worn license tags shall be replaced by the owner or person keeping a dog or cat by applying for a license and paying the license fee as provided by this section.
- (2) The owner or keeper of dogs or cats owned, boarded or kept within a kennel and which dogs or cats are not licensed and displaying a permanent license tag, as provided by this section, shall cause the dogs or cats to either:
- (a) Display a permanent license tag on which shall appear the number assigned the kennel at the time payment of the license fee is made; or
- (b) Display on a collar worn by the dog or cat the name and phone number of the current owner.
- (E) The amount of any license fee imposed by this section shall be deemed a debt to the county. Any person owning, having or keeping any dog or cat in the county on or after November 1, 2001, without having obtained a license so to do shall be liable to an action in the name of the county in any court of competent jurisdiction for the amount of any license fee imposed by and required by this section to be paid for the privilege of keeping and having a dog or cat. The animal control officer is authorized to cause a complaint to be filed against any person violating any of the provisions of this section and to cause an action to be brought against

any person failing to pay any license fee required by the provisions of this section for the recovery of the license fee. The action shall be cumulative and shall not be deemed as a bar or waiver of the right to institute any other civil or criminal proceeding for a violation of this section.

(F) The provisions of this section requiring dogs and cats to be licensed shall not apply to those dogs or cats owned by or in the charge or care of persons who are nonresidents of the county or temporarily within the county for a period not exceeding 30 days, nor to dogs or cats temporarily brought into the county for the exclusive purpose of entering the dogs or cats in a show or other exhibition and entered for and kept at the show or exhibition, nor to dogs used as lead dogs for blind persons.

§ 93.99 PENALTY.

Any person who violates any provision of this chapter shall be fined not more than \$500 or imprisoned for not more than 30 days. (Ord. 2001-6-1, passed 6-4-01)

Sheriff Kevin Jones addressed the Board concerning Ms. Smart's request. The Sheriff's Office has received several complaints in regard to this situation with documentation dating back to May 2020 and could go back farther than that; complaints of unsanitary and conditions for the animals which included inadequate water, inadequate shade and animal waste in the pen. The owner was contacted and warned that if conditions did not improve she would be charged. Living conditions have improved. Sheriff Jones made it clear that these are wolves, not dogs, and described their behavior as predatory. The behavior of the wolves and noise from their howling create a nuisance for the neighbors. He is in support of an amendment to the Animal Ordinance but it needs to be adapted for Camden County and enforceable by his Office.

Commissioner Munro questioned if the owner of the animals was present in the meeting. The owner was not present.

Alan & Peggy Coe of Edgewater Drive addressed the Board in support of the request to amend the Animal Ordinance. They support Ms. Smart's findings and request to amend the Animal Ordinance. They are concerned for their safety and that of their pet. They also mentioned that the owner is rarely on the property.

Mrs. Coe shared the following written comments from nearby residents who are also in support of amending the Animal Ordinance.

B. Micro Bar Screen Proposal – David Credle

The Courthouse Area WWTP was built with a standard bar screen with one-inch spacing at the headworks. This typical setup works well for most gravity collection systems. The ongoing issue we have is all our flow is delivered to the plant by grinder pumps. The grinder pumps cut everything into small particles that aren't intercepted by the bar screen. The small particles collect in the influent tank into a thick mat that covers the entire tank. The paper also works its way through the whole treatment process, clogging pipes and chemical feed lines.

The solution to this problem is a Micro Bar Screen. The micro screen has 2mm spacings to trap even the smallest particles and a scraper to keep the screen from being clogged. The scrapper brings the materials to the top of the bar screen to be collected in a trash can or dumpster as needed. The State requires plans and specifications for the installation of the new bar screen which is considered a minor permit modification. Timmons Group has agreed to complete the engineering work for the permit modification. The bar screen will fit into the existing tank we have for the standard bar screen and only requires a few anchor bolts. The bar screen comes with a control panel, and will need electrical power ran from the control panel to the breaker panel.

The cost estimate for this project is \$100,000 with \$41,000 coming from the current year's budget and \$59,000 coming from next year's budget. The lead time for delivery of this equipment is 12-18 weeks.

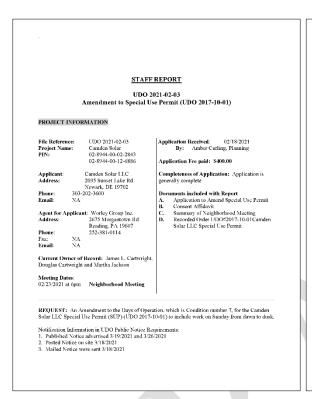

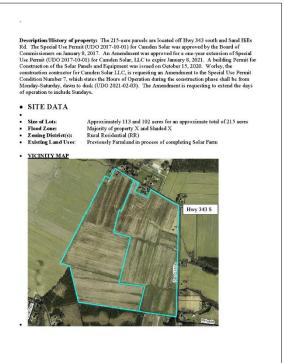

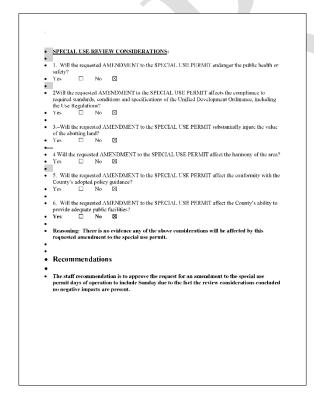

Mr. Steven Bradshaw, representing the applicant, addressed the Board and included the following information in his remarks:

Downgrading of the current Planned Unit Development zoning for the northern parcel to Suburban Residential will greatly reduce the amount of residential density while the rezoning of the southern parcel from Working Lands to Suburban Residential, will provide continuity with the adjacent residential pockets along One Mill Road and Avery Drive. The combination of reduced density, potential for conservation areas and the development of shoreline property, will contribute to a lower impact development with less demand on infrastructure while highlighting higher valued property. At the most, there will be one house per acre, which means there would be no more than 90 homes. Mr. Bradshaw pointed out that his residence is adjacent to the property. Preliminary testing indicates there should not be septic issues. The cost of the homes to be constructed is estimated at \$400K-\$450K as they will be on waterfront lots.

Chairman Tom White called for public comments.

Mr. Gary Overton of Shiloh spoke in opposition to the rezoning request. Mr. Overton's farm is adjacent to this property. WHEREAS, this vital service, which began in 1978 serves the citizens of North Carolina from the mountains to the coast, educates stakeholders about the need for exeavation safety whether the project is as small as planting a tree to designing and beginning construction on a new interstate; and

WHEREAS, in 2020, the North Carolina one call system received 2.1 million notification requests and transmitted over 12.2 million requests, providing protection to utility companies infrastructure, their employees, excavators, and customers;

- 1. The Auditor shall audit all statements and disclosures required by U.S. generally accepted auditing standards (GAAS) and additional required legal statements and disclosures of all funds and/or divisions of the Governmental Unit(s). The non-major combining, and individual fund statements and schedules shall be subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and an opinion shall be rendered in relation to (as applicable) the governmental activities, the business- type activities, the aggregate DPCUs, each major governmental and enterprise fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information (non-major government and enterprise funds, the internal service fund type, and the fiduciary fund types).
- 2. At a minimum, the Auditor shall conduct his/her audit and render his/her report in accordance with GAAS. The Auditor shall perform the audit in accordance with Government Auditing Standards if required by the State Single Audit Implementation Act, as codified in G.S. 159-34. If required by OMB Uniform Administration Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards (Uniform Guidance) and the State Single Audit Implementation Act, the Auditor shall perform a Single Audit. This audit and all associated audit documentation may be subject to review by Federal and State agencies in accordance with Federal and State laws, including the staffs of the Office of State Auditor (OSA) and the Local Government Commission (LGC), If the audit requires a federal single audit performed under the requirements found in Subpart F of the Uniform Guidance (§200.501), it is recommended that the Auditor and Governmental Unit(s) jointly agree, in advance of the execution of this contract, which party is responsible for submission of the audit and the accompanying data collection form to the Federal Audit Clearinghouse as required under the Uniform Guidance (§200.512).

If the audit and Auditor communication are found in this review to be substandard, the results of the review may be forwarded to the North Carolina State Board of CPA Examiners (NC State Board).

- 3. If an entity is determined to be a component of another government as defined by the group audit standards, the entity's auditor shall make a good faith effort to comply in a timely manner with the requests of the group auditor in accordance with AU-6 §600.41 §600.42.
- 4. This contract contemplates an unmodified opinion being rendered. If during the process of conducting the audit, the Auditor determines that it will not be possible to render an unmodified opinion on the financial statements of the unit, the Auditor shall contact the LGC Staff to discuss the circumstances leading to that conclusion as soon as is practical and before the final report is issued. The audit shall include such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as are considered by the Auditor to be necessary in the circumstances. Any limitations or restrictions in scope which would lead to a qualification should be fully explained in an attachment to this contract.
- 5. If this audit engagement is subject to the standards for audit as defined in *Government Auditing Standards*, 2018 revision, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, then by accepting this engagement, the Auditor warrants that he/she has met the requirements for a peer review and continuing education as specified in *Government Auditing Standards*. The Auditor agrees to provide a copy of the most recent peer review report to the Governmental Unit(s) and the Secretary of the LGC prior to the execution of an audit contract. Subsequent submissions of the report are required only upon report expiration or upon auditor's receipt of an updated peer review report. If the audit firm received a peer review rating other than pass, the Auditor shall not contract with the Governmental Unit(s) without first contacting the Secretary of the LGC for a peer review analysis that may result in additional contractual requirements.

If the audit engagement is not subject to *Government Accounting Standards* or if financial statements are not prepared in accordance with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) and fail to include all disclosures required by GAAP, the Auditor shall provide an explanation as to why in an attachment to this contract or in an amendment.

- 6. It is agreed that time is of the essence in this contract. All audits are to be performed and the report of audit submitted to LGC Staff within four months of fiscal year end. If it becomes necessary to amend this due date or the audit fee, an amended contract along with a written explanation of the delay shall be submitted to the Secretary of the LGC for approval.
- 7. It is agreed that GAAS include a review of the Governmental Unit's (Units') systems of internal control and accounting as same relate to accountability of funds and adherence to budget and law requirements applicable thereto; that the Auditor shall make a written report, which may or may not be a part of the written report of audit, to the Governing Board setting forth his/her findings, together with his recommendations for improvement. That written report shall include all matters defined as "significant deficiencies and material weaknesses" in AU-C 265 of the AICPA Professional Standards (Clarified). The Auditor shall file a copy of that report with the Secretary of the LGC.
- 8. All local government and public authority contracts for audit or audit-related work require the approval of the Secretary of the LGC. This includes annual or special audits, agreed upon procedures related to internal controls, bookkeeping or other assistance necessary to prepare the Governmental Unit's (Units') records for audit, financial statement preparation, any finance-related investigations, or any other audit- related work in the State of North Carolina. Approval is not required on contracts and invoices for system improvements and similar services of a non-auditing nature.
- 9. Invoices for services rendered under these contracts shall not be paid by the Governmental Unit(s) until the invoice has been approved by the Secretary of the LGC. (This also includes any progress billings.)[G.S. 159-34 and 115C-447] All invoices for Audit work shall be submitted in PDF format to the Secretary of the LGC for approval. The invoice marked 'approved 'with approval date shall be returned to

the Auditor to present to the Governmental Unit(s) for payment. This paragraph is not applicable to contracts for audits of hospitals.

- 10. In consideration of the satisfactory performance of the provisions of this contract, the Governmental Unit(s) shall pay to the Auditor, upon approval by the Secretary of the LGC if required, the fee, which includes any costs the Auditor may incur from work paper or peer reviews or any other quality assurance program required by third parties (federal and state grantor and oversight agencies or other organizations) as required under the Federal and State Single Audit Acts. This does not include fees for any pre-issuance reviews that may be required by the NC Association of CPAs (NCACPA) Peer Review Committee or NC State Board of CPA Examiners (see Item 13).
- 11. If the Governmental Unit(s) has/have outstanding revenue bonds, the Auditor shall submit to LGC Staff, either in the notes to the audited financial statements or as a separate report, a calculation demonstrating compliance with the revenue bond rate covenant. Additionally, the Auditor shall submit to LGC Staff simultaneously with the Governmental Unit's (Units') audited financial statements any other bond compliance statements or additional reports required by the authorizing bond documents, unless otherwise specified in the bond documents.
- 12. After completing the audit, the Auditor shall submit to the Governing Board a written report of audit. This report shall include, but not be limited to, the following information: (a) Management's Discussion and Analysis, (b) the financial statements and notes of the Governmental Unit(s) and all of its component units prepared in accordance with GAAP, (c) supplementary information requested by the Governmental Unit(s) or required for full disclosure under the law, and (d) the Auditor's opinion on the material presented. The Auditor shall furnish the required number of copies of the report of audit to the Governing Board upon completion.
- 13. If the audit firm is required by the NC State Board, the NCACPA Peer Review Committee, or the Secretary of the LGC to have a pre-issuance review of its audit work, there shall be a statement in the engagement letter indicating the pre-issuance review requirement. There also shall be a statement that the Governmental Unit(s) shall not be billed for the pre-issuance review. The pre-issuance review shall be performed prior to the completed audit being submitted to LGC Staff. The pre-issuance review report shall accompany the audit report upon submission to LGC Staff.
- 14. The Auditor shall submit the report of audit in PDF format to LGC Staff. For audits of units other than hospitals, the audit report should be submitted when (or prior to) submitting the final invoice for services rendered. The report of audit, as filed with the Secretary of the LGC, becomes a matter of public record for inspection, review and copy in the offices of the LGC by any interested parties. Any subsequent revisions to these reports shall be sent to the Secretary of the LGC along with an Audit Report Reissued Form (available on the Department of State Treasurer website). These audited financial statements, excluding the Auditors' opinion, may be used in the preparation of official statements for debt offerings by municipal bond rating services to fulfill secondary market disclosure requirements of the Securities and Exchange Commission and for other lawful purposes of the Governmental Unit(s) without requiring consent of the Auditor. If the LGC Staff determines that corrections need to be made to the Governmental Unit's (Units') financial statements, those corrections shall be provided within three business days of notification unless another deadline is agreed to by LGC Staff.
- 15. Should circumstances disclosed by the audit call for a more detailed investigation by the Auditor than necessary under ordinary circumstances, the Auditor shall inform the Governing Board in writing of the need for such additional investigation and the additional compensation required therefore. Upon approval by the

Secretary of the LGC, this contract may be modified or amended to include the increased time, compensation, or both as may be agreed upon by the Governing Board and the Auditor.

- 16. If an approved contract needs to be modified or amended for any reason, the change shall be made in writing and pre-audited if the change includes a change in audit fee (pre-audit requirement does not apply to charter schools or hospitals). This amended contract shall be completed in full, including a written explanation of the change, signed and dated by all original parties to the contract. It shall then be submitted to the Secretary of the LGC for approval. No change to the audit contract shall be effective unless approved by the Secretary of the LGC, the Governing Board, and the Auditor.
- 17. A copy of the engagement letter, issued by the Auditor and signed by both the Auditor and the Governmental Unit(s), shall be attached to this contract, and except for fees, work, and terms not related to audit services, shall be incorporated by reference as if fully set forth herein as part of this contract. In case of conflict between the terms of the engagement letter and the terms of this contract, the terms of this contract shall take precedence. Engagement letter terms that conflict with the contract are deemed to be void unless the conflicting terms of this contract are specifically deleted in Item 28 of this contract. Engagement letters containing indemnification clauses shall not be accepted by LGC Staff.
- 18. Special provisions should be limited. Please list any special provisions in an attachment.
- 19. A separate contract should not be made for each division to be audited or report to be submitted. If a DPCU is subject to the audit requirements detailed in the Local Government Budget and Fiscal Control Act and a separate audit report is issued, a separate audit contract is required. If a separate report is not to be issued and the DPCU is included in the primary government audit, the DPCU shall be named along with the primary government on this audit contract. DPCU Board approval date, signatures from the DPCU Board chairman and finance officer also shall be included on this contract.
- 20. The contract shall be executed, pre-audited (pre-audit requirement does not apply to charter schools or hospitals), and physically signed by all parties including Governmental Unit(s) and the Auditor, then submitted in PDF format to the Secretary of the LGC.
- 21. The contract is not valid until it is approved by the Secretary of the LGC. The staff of the LGC shall notify the Governmental Unit and Auditor of contract approval by email. The audit should not be started before the contract is approved.
- 22. Retention of Client Records: Auditors are subject to the NC State Board of CPA Examiners' Retention of Client Records Rule 21 NCAC 08N .0305 as it relates to the provision of audit and other attest services, as well as non-attest services. Clients and former clients should be familiar with the requirements of this rule prior to requesting the return of records.
- 23. This contract may be terminated at any time by mutual consent and agreement of the Governmental Unit(s) and the Auditor, provided that (a) the consent to terminate is in writing and signed by both parties, (b) the parties have agreed on the fee amount which shall be paid to the Auditor (if applicable), and (c) no termination shall be effective until approved in writing by the Secretary of the LGC.

If the Auditor determines that an individual with the appropriate SKE cannot be identified, the Auditor cannot perform both the non-attest service(s) and the audit. See "Fees for Audit Services" page of this contract to disclose the person identified as having the appropriate SKE for the Governmental Unit.

- 28. Applicable to audits with fiscal year ends of June 30, 2021 and later. The auditor shall present the audited financial statements including any compliance reports to the government unit's governing body or audit committee in an official meeting in open session as soon as the audited financial statements are available but not later than 45 days after the submission of the audit report to the Secretary. The auditor's presentation to the government unit's governing body or audit committee shall include:
 - a) the description of each finding, including all material weaknesses and significant deficiencies, as found by the auditor, and any other issues related to the internal controls or fiscal health of the government unit as disclosed in the management letter, the Single Audit or Yellow Book reports, or any other communications from the auditor regarding internal controls as required by current auditing standards set by the Accounting Standards Board or its successor;
 - b) the status of the prior year audit findings;
 - c) the values of Financial Performance Indicators based on information presented in the audited financial statements; and
 - d) notification to the governing body that the governing body shall develop a "Response to the Auditor's Findings, Recommendations, and Fiscal Matters," if required under 20 NCAC 03 .0508.
- 29. Information based on the audited financial statements shall be submitted to the Secretary for the purpose of identifying Financial Performance Indicators and Financial Performance Indicators of Concern.

- 30. Applicable to charter school contracts only: No indebtedness of any kind incurred or created by the charter school shall constitute an indebtedness of the State or its political subdivisions, and no indebtedness of the charter school shall involve or be secured by the faith, credit, or taxing power of the State or its political subdivisions.
- 31. All of the above paragraphs are understood and shall apply to this contract, except the following numbered paragraphs shall be deleted (See Item 16 for clarification).
- 32. The process for submitting contracts, audit reports and invoices is subject to change. Auditors and units should use the submission process and instructions in effect at the time of submission. CAMDEN COUNTY VISITOR CENTER

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into on the last date executed below, by and between the North Carolina Department of Transportation, an agency of the State of North Carolina, hereinafter referred to as the "Department" and Camden County Visitor Center, hereinafter referred to as "County".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the 2011-2012 General Assembly of the State of North Carolina passed legislation providing the Dismal Swamp Canal Visitor Center located on Route 17 in Camden County, certain funds for operating costs for the Center in the amount of \$142,857; and,

WHEREAS, said funding shall be appropriated annually until such time as General Statutes 20-79.7(c)(2) and General Statutes 20-85(a1) is modified or deleted, or the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina changes or deletes funding for said Visitor Center; and,

WHEREAS, the Department has the responsibility for conveying and monitoring the funds appropriated by the General Assembly to the County for the operation of the Visitor Center subject to the conditions hereinafter set forth; and,

WHEREAS, administration of these funds shall be by a State chartered nonprofit organization or local government agency pursuant to Chapter 752; Senate Bill 44, Section 153(a), 1989 Session Laws;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto, each in consideration of the promises and undertakings of the other as herein provided, do hereby covenant and agree, each with the other, as follows:

OPERATION OF VISITOR CENTER

- A. The County shall be responsible for the operation of the Visitor Center and the administration of these funds and be responsible for maintaining all records and documentation required by the Department's Fiscal Branch in accordance with the Department's regulations and OMB Circular A-102 for governmental entities.
- B. The Visitor Center will be staffed and operated on a reasonable daily year round basis, not less than 6 days per week, eight hours per day, to include all holidays except Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, and New Year's Day.
- C. The County will be responsible for cleanup and maintenance of the Visitor Center buildings, including all repairs to the interior building, systems and exterior doors, up to a maximum of \$500 per item. Repairs in excess of \$500 will be the responsibility of the Department. The Department shall be notified of such repairs prior to the repair being completed. Any permanent changes that the County might propose for the interior of the building shall be approved by the Division Engineer prior to completion of any work.
- D. The County must have prior written approval from the Department before entering into any Operating Agreement with another party and such Agreement must include a full accounting of the cost of the Agreement and be subject to the same audit requirements as the County.
- E. The Secretary of Transportation has reserved the annual sum of \$142,857 from the Special Registration Plate Account (SRPA) to assist in operating costs for the Visitor Center in Camden County. Upon receipt and approval by the Department's Financial Management Division of an invoice and all other required documents, the Department will disburse the payment of that funding to the County in quarterly payments beginning July 1 annually. An amendment will be added should this amount change prior to the completion of this agreement.
- F. The annual funding is expressly for the operating costs of the visitor center. Attached as Exhibit "A" is a list of purposes for which Visitor Center funds can and cannot be used. Any unused portion, whether from the County or any subcontracted Agreement, shall be reimbursed to the Department.

2. DISBURSEMENT OF FUNDS GUIDANCE

- A. The County shall submit the following when requesting reimbursement:
 - I. An invoice, a completed Request for Payment Appropriation and DBE-IS form. All forms and examples referenced in this Agreement are attached.
 - II. A spread sheet showing Visitor Counts for the most recent calendar year, including a month-by-month visitor count and an explanation of how such data was collected.
 - III. The Visitor Center's annual budget and operating plan, including a list of all other funding sources for the visitor center, the number of employees and volunteers, the days and hours of operation, and a training schedule for employees/volunteers.
 - IV. Copies of any operating or maintenance Agreements entered into as a part of operating the visitor center.
 - V. A Copy of the General Ledger accounting for the previous year's expenditures in Excel format and only for the funding received from the Department. Other funding sources should not be mixed with Department funding or should be clearly labeled as such. This information does not have to be submitted on a yearly basis, but upon request by the Department.
- B. Standards for allowability of labor and fringe benefit costs shall apply as set forth in Office of Management and Budget OMB A-87 (for governmental entities).
- C. No additional funds will be paid to the County for any fiscal year for expenditures exceeding \$142,857. If the audited approved expenditures for any fiscal year are less than \$142,857, the County shall refund the difference to the Department within sixty (60) days of notification from the Department of monies due. The Department shall charge a late payment penalty and interest on any unpaid balance due, in accordance with G.S. 147-86.23.

REPORTING REQUIREMENTS AND RECORDS RETENTION

PROJECT RECORDS

The County and its agents shall maintain all books, documents, papers, accounting records, Project records and such other evidence as may be appropriate to substantiate costs incurred under this Agreement. Records should be kept in an electronic format and backed up in a secure location. Further, the County shall make such materials available at

its office and shall require its agent to make such materials available at its office at all reasonable times during the contract period, and for three (3) years from the date of payment of the final reimbursement by the Department, for inspection and audit by the Department's Financial Management Section.

4. PROCEDURES FOR GOVERNMENTAL ENTITY

The following audit procedures shall be adhered to if the County is a Governmental Entity:

- A. The County is subject to the requirements of G.S. 159-34 and the applicable prescribed requirements of the Local Government Commission, Office of the State Treasurer.
- B. If the County receives, uses, or expends state funds of \$500,000 or more during its' fiscal year, it must have a single audit performed in accordance with OMB Circular A-133. It must be approved by the Local Government Commission, Office of State Treasurer.
- C. The County shall furnish the Department with a copy of the independent audit report within nine (9) months following the end of the fiscal year. Failure to submit said requested documents may result in the withholding of the appropriated funds until such time as said documents are received and, in the opinion of the Department, are satisfactory.

5. PROCEDURES FOR NON-PROFIT ENTITY

The following audit procedures shall be adhered to if the County is a Non-Profit Entity:

The County shall comply with all applicable audit and reporting requirements of Title 9, Subchapter 2M of the North Carolina Administrative Code (including any subsequent amendments or additions to such requirements. This includes filing with the Department, no later than six (6) months after the end of your fiscal year the following forms:

- NGO 0001 State Grant Certification and Sworn Statement.
- NGO 0003 State Grants Compliance Reporting for 25K or more
- NGO 0004 Program Activities and Accomplishments
- NGO 0005 Schedule of Receipts and Expenditures

6. TIME FRAME

Subject to the provisions stated herein, the Agreement becomes effective the date of execution, or July 1, 2021 (whichever is later) and remains in effect until June 30, 2024, or until cancelled by either party as described herein.

This Agreement shall remain active with extensions possible for additional one-year periods, up to four (4) years extension through June 30, 2028. At the end of each one-year renewal period, upon written extension, this Agreement shall continue as written or as modified with the understanding that the Department and/or the County reserves the right to cancel this Agreement with a sixty (60) day written notice to the opposite party.

In the event either party to this Agreement should choose to withdraw from this Agreement, written notification must be given to the other entity sixty (60) days prior to withdrawal.

Notwithstanding the foregoing or any other provision of this Agreement, failure on the part of the County to comply with any of the provisions included in the Agreement or subsequently approved Supplemental Agreements will be grounds for the Department to immediately terminate its participation in this Agreement without the necessity of the sixty (60) day notice period described above.

7. OTHER PROVISIONS

REFERENCES

It will be the responsibility of the County to follow the current and/or most recent edition of references, websites, specifications, standards, guidelines, recommendations, regulations and/or General Statutes, as stated in this Agreement.

INDEMNIFICATION OF DEPARTMENT

The County agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Department and the State of North Carolina, to the extent allowed by law, for any and all claim for payment, damages and/or liabilities of any nature, asserted against the Department in connection with this Project. The Department shall not be responsible for any damages or claims, which may be initiated by third parties.

DEBARMENT POLICY

It is the policy of the Department not to enter into any Agreement with parties that have been debarred by any government agency (Federal or State). By execution of this Agreement, the County certifies that neither it nor its agents or contractors are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible or voluntarily excluded from participation in this transaction by any Federal or State Agency or Department and that it will not enter into Agreements with any entity that is debarred, suspended, proposed

for debarment, declared ineligible or voluntarily excluded from participation in this transaction.

AVAILABILITY OF FUNDS

All terms and conditions of this Agreement are dependent upon and subject to the allocation and appropriation of funds for the purpose set forth in the Agreement, and the Agreement shall automatically terminate if funds cease to be available.

USE OF POWELL BILL FUNDS

If the other party to this Agreement is a Municipality and fails for any reason to reimburse the Department in accordance with the provisions for payment hereinabove provided, NCGS 136-41.3 authorizes the Department to withhold so much of the Municipality's share of funds allocated to Municipality by NCGS 136-41.1, until such time as the Department has received payment in full.

If the other party to this Agreement is a Non-profit and fails for any reason to reimburse the Department in accordance with the provisions for payment herein above provided, the Department will reduce the amount of the next payment or payments as needed to cover the full repayment of funds.

TITLE VI

The other party to this Agreement shall comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Title 49 CFR, Subtitle A, Part 21) and related nondiscrimination authorities. Title VI and related authorities prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, disability, gender, and age in all programs or activities of any recipient of Federal assistance.

GIFT BAN

By Executive Order 24, issued by Governor Perdue, and N.C. G.S.§ 133-32, it is unlawful for any vendor or contractor (i.e. architect, bidder, contractor, construction manager, design professional, engineer, landlord, offeror, seller, subcontractor, supplier, or vendor), to make gifts or to give favors to any State employee of the Governor's Cabinet Agencies (i.e., Administration, Commerce, Environmental Quality, Health and Human Services, Information Technology, Military and Veterans Affairs, Natural and Cultural Resources, Public Safety, Revenue, Transportation, and the Office of the Governor).

AMENDMENTS

This Agreement may be amended only by written amendments duly executed by both parties.

EXECUTION OF AGREEMENT

A copy or facsimile copy of the signature of any party shall be deemed an original with each fully executed copy of the Agreement as binding as an original, and the parties agree that this Agreement can be executed in counterparts, as duplicate originals, with facsimile signatures sufficient to evidence an agreement to be bound by the terms of the Agreement.

ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement and any documents incorporated specifically by reference represent the entire Agreement between the parties and supersede all prior oral or written statements or Agreements. All documents incorporated by reference are available online for review by both parties.

- 2. Payments to contractors, employment agencies and third parties for the operation and staffing of the Visitor Center.
- Workers Compensation and Liability Insurance and insurance on the organizations' contents for the operation and staffing of the Visitor Center facility.
- 4. Office supplies and expenses such as postage fees, computers, internet, telephones, furniture, and audio-visual equipment used in the operation of the Visitor Center.
- 5. Visitor Center building lease or rental fees.
- 6. Utility services such as telephone, internet, water, sewer, gas/oil, electricity, and trash pickup for the Visitor Center.
- 7. Visitor Center building repairs, maintenance, janitorial and grounds maintenance services.
- 8. Visitor Center advertising and marketing literature, brochures, banners, signs, website development and operation.
- 9. Miscellaneous administrative costs (book keeping, internal and external audits, attorney fees) for the Visitor Center.
- 10. Travel expenses for Visitor Center operation and training, similar to DOC Welcome Center Hostess training.
- 11. Supplies for hosting meetings and promotional activities located at the Visitor Center (not to include meals or food and drink of any kind).
- 12. Banking Fees associated with checking account only for the Visitor Center. A prorated fee associated with a General Fund Checking account with Visitor Center funds is not eligible. Banking fees are only eligible if the checking account is established only for Visitor Center funds.
- 13. Payments to contractors for any of the above.

PURPOSES FOR WHICH VISITOR CENTER FUNDS CAN NOT BE USED ARE:

- 1. Expenditures for activities that are not directly related to the operation of the Visitor Center, and/or are not held on the Visitor Center property.
- 2. If items are questionable, a request for approval from the Department should be made prior to expenditure.

Summary:

The proposed ordinance presents several text changes to the Camden County Unified development Ordinance (UDO). The changes are necessary to comply with a new state law embodied in General Statute 160D.

Chapter 160D is a new chapter in the General Statutes that consolidates the land use regulations found in GS 153A (for counties) and Chapter 160A (for municipalities), reorganizes the regulations, and incorporates into law the many court decisions handed down over the years since the initial laws were written. The deadline for cities and counties to make the necessary changes to comply with the new law is July 1, 2021.

The new chapter is the result of over 4 years of drafting and submitting to the legislature by the NC Bar Association, NC Homebuilders Association, UNC School of Government, the NC Chapter of the America Planning Association, and reviewed by planners and lawyers from around the state.
