MINUTES

The regular meeting of the Camden County Board of Commissioners was held on Monday, April 5, 2010 at 7:00 p.m., with a Closed Session held at 6:00 p.m., in the Historic Courtroom, Camden, North Carolina. The following members were present:

Vice Chair Sandy Duckwall Commissioners Melvin Jeralds, Garry Meiggs and Michael McLain

Chairman Philip Faison was out of town.

Also present was County Manager Randell Woodruff, Clerk to the Board Ava Gurganus and Attorney John Morrison.

Closed Session

Commissioner Michael McLain made a motion to go into closed session pursuant to G.S. 143-318.11(a)(3) for the purpose of Consultation with Attorney and pursuant to G.S. 143-318.11(a)(6) for the purpose of discussing Personnel. The motion passed with Commissioners Melvin Jeralds, Sandy Duckwall, and Michael McLain voting aye; no Commissioner voting no; Chairman Philip Faison and Commissioner Garry Meiggs absent; and no Commissioner not voting.

The Commissioners entered closed session at 6:00 p.m.

Commissioner Michael McLain made a motion to come out of closed session. The motion passed with Commissioners Melvin Jeralds, Commissioner Garry Meiggs, Sandy Duckwall, and Michael McLain voting aye; no Commissioner voting no; Chairman Philip Faison absent; and no Commissioner not voting.

The Commissioners re-entered regular session at 6:36 p.m. and recessed until 7:00 p.m.

Invocation & Pledge of Allegiance

Commissioner Melvin Jeralds gave the invocation and lead those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

PRESENTATION - College of the Albemarle (COA)

Roger Lambertson, Vice President of Trustees, introduced Acting President Ray Scaffia and Vice President for Business and Finance Jim Turdici. Mr. Lambertson thanked the Board for their support and stated COA will provide a formal budget request in the near future. Mr. Lambertson further stated that COA has the largest curriculum enrollment in the history of the college with 228 Camden residents in degree and diploma programs for the Spring 2010 semester; \$270,730 has been disbursed in scholarship and student aid for 2009-2010 academic year for students residing in Camden County; a new program called *Jobs Now Program* using federal stimulus money for training people in sheet metal working, solar energy installation, home energy auditing, sustainable landscaping, weatherization, green cleaning, medical billing and coding, pharmacy technician and veterinary assisting; seventy six (76) Camden residents were trained in occupational extension classes including Fire Training and EMS in 2009; basic skills training to one hundred twenty two (122) students from Camden County between January 2009 and December 2009.

Public Comments

No comments were heard from the public.

Consideration of Agenda

Draft Minutes – March 31, 2010 Joint Meeting with Board of Education and New Business, Item 7. I. Donation to Potato Festival to the agenda.

Commissioner Michael McLain made a motion to approve the agenda as amended. The motion passed with Commissioners Melvin Jeralds, Commissioner Garry Meiggs, Sandy Duckwall, and Michael McLain voting aye; no Commissioner voting no; Chairman Philip Faison absent; and no Commissioner not voting.

Old Business - Tourism Development Authority (TDA)

Commissioner Michael McLain made a motion to approve the Bylaws for the TDA as revised. The motion passed with Commissioners Melvin Jeralds, Commissioner Garry Meiggs, Sandy Duckwall, and Michael McLain voting aye; no Commissioner voting no; Chairman Philip Faison absent; and no Commissioner not voting.

BYLAWS FOR CAMDEN COUNTY TOURISM DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY (TDA)

The Camden County Board of Commissioners, per Resolution No. 2004-10-02 dated October 18, 2004, created a Tourism Development Authority.

The following Bylaws adopted by the Camden County Board of Commissioners are for the purpose of the Camden County Tourism Development Authority (TDA) to follow when conducting public business:

1. <u>Regular Meetings</u>

The TDA shall hold a quarterly meeting on the second Tuesday of the first month in each quarter (Jan. April, July, Oct.). Exceptions may occur if regular meeting dates fall on a legal holiday. The meeting shall be held on the next business day, with acceptance of TDA majority. Meetings shall be held in the Camden County Historic Courtroom, and shall begin at 9:30 a.m., unless otherwise stated.

2. Special Meetings

The Chair, or a majority of the members of the TDA, may at any time call a special meeting of the Camden TDA by signing a written notice stating the time and place of the meeting and the subjects to be considered. The Chair or the members who call the meeting shall provide notice to the TDA Chairperson at least 48 hours before the meeting. Only those items of business specified in the notice may be transacted at a special meeting, unless all members are present or absentees have signed a written waiver.

If a special meeting is called to deal with an emergency, the notice requirements of this rule do not apply. However, the person or persons who call an emergency special meeting shall take reasonable action to inform the other members and the public of the meeting. Only business connected with the emergency may be discussed at the meeting.

3. <u>Organizational Meeting</u>

On the second Tuesday in October following the end of the fiscal year in which authority members are appointed, the TDA shall meet at the regular meeting time and place. The newly elected members of the TDA shall take and subscribe the oath of office as the first order of business. The Secretary to the TDA shall preside until a new Chair is appointed by the Camden County Board of

Commissioners. Following the appointment of a Chair, the TDA shall elect a Vice-Chair from among its members.

4. Agenda

The TDA Chair shall prepare the agenda for the meeting. A request to have an item of business placed on the agenda must be received at least 3 working days before the meeting. Any TDA member may, by a timely request, have an item placed on the agenda.

The agenda shall include, for each item of business placed on it, as much background information on the subject as is available and feasible to reproduce which shall be attached to the agenda. A copy of the agenda and attached materials shall be available for public inspection as soon as they are completed. Each TDA member shall receive a copy of the agenda.

5. Public Address to the Authority

Any individual or group who wishes to address the TDA shall make a request to be on the agenda to the TDA Chair at least 3 working days prior to the meeting.

6. Order of Business

Items shall be placed on the agenda according to the "Order of Business." The Order of Business for each regular meeting shall be as follows:

- 1. Call to order
- 2. Approval of minutes
- 3. Public comments
- 4. Discussion/adjustment of agenda
- 5. Public Hearing
- 6. Old Business
- 7. New Business
- 8. Committee Reports and Proposals
- 10. Chairman's Report
- 11. Adjournment

However, by general consent of the TDA, items may be considered out of order.

7. Powers of the Presiding Officer

The TDA Chair shall preside at meetings of the TDA. A member must be recognized by the Chair in order to address the TDA. The Chair shall have the following powers:

- 1. To rule motions in or out of order including the right to rule out of order any motion patently offered for obstructive or dilatory purposes;
- 2. To determine whether a speaker has gone beyond reasonable standards of courtesy in his remarks and to entertain and rule on objections from other members on this ground;
- 3. To entertain and answer questions of parliamentary law or procedure;
- 4. To call a brief recess at any time;
- 5. To adjourn in an emergency.

8. Action by the TDA

The TDA shall proceed by motion. Any member, including the TDA Chair, may make a motion.

9. <u>Second Required</u>

A motion shall require a second.

10. One Motion at a Time

A member may make only one motion at a time.

11. <u>Substantive Motion</u>

A substantive motion is out of order while another substantive motion is pending.

12. Adoption by Majority Vote

A motion shall be adopted by a majority of the votes cast, a quorum being present, unless otherwise required by these rules or the laws of North Carolina.

13. <u>Debate</u>

The Chair shall state the motion and then open the floor to debate on it. The Chair shall preside over the debate according to these general principles:

- (a) The introducer, the member who makes the motion is entitled to speak first;
- (b) A member who has not spoken on the issue shall be recognized before someone who has already spoken;
- (c) To the extent possible, the debate shall alternate between the opponents and the proponents of the measure.

14. Procedural Motions

In addition to substantive proposals, the following procedural motions, and no others, shall be in order.

- 1. To Adjourn. The motion may be made only at the conclusion of action on a pending matter; it may not interrupt deliberation of a pending matter.
- 2. To Take a Recess.
- Call to Follow the Agenda. The motion must be made at the first reasonable opportunity or it is waived.
- 4. To Amend. An amendment to a motion must be germane to the subject matter of the motion, but it may achieve the opposite effect of the motion.
- 5. To Revive Consideration. The motion is in order at any time 60 days after a vote to defer consideration of it. A substantive motion on which consideration has been deferred expires 60 days after the deferral, unless a motion to revive consideration is adopted.
- 6. To Reconsider. The motion must be made by a member who voted with the prevailing side. The motion must be made at the same meeting at which the original vote was taken. The motion cannot interrupt deliberation on a pending matter but is in order at any time before adjournment.
- 7. To Prevent Reconsideration for 90 days. The motion shall be in order immediately following the defeat of a substantive motion and at no other time. The motion requires a vote equal to a quorum and is valid for 90 days or until the next regular meeting, whichever occurs first.

15. Renewal of Motion

A motion that is defeated may be renewed at any subsequent meeting unless a motion to prevent reconsideration has been adopted.

16. <u>Withdrawal of a Motion</u>

After a second motion has been withdrawn, a motion may be withdrawn by the introducer at any time before a vote.

17. <u>Duty to Vote</u>

Every member must vote unless excused by a majority vote according to law. A member who wishes to be excused from voting, prior to any discussion being held, shall so inform the Chair who shall take a vote of the remaining members. The TDA may only excuse a member from voting on matters involving his own financial interest or official conduct.

18. Adoption of the TDA Budget and Authorization of Expenditures

The TDA shall propose and submit a budget to the County Manager's Office according to the budget schedule adopted by the Camden County Board of Commissioners. The TDA may make no single expenditure in excess of \$1,000.00 without the expressed permission of the Camden County Board of Commissioners given in open session of the Board of Commissioners.

19. Quorum

A majority of the membership of the Tourism Development Authority shall constitute a quorum. The number required for a quorum shall not be affected by vacancies. If a member has withdrawn from a meeting without being excused by majority vote of the remaining members present, he shall be counted as present for the purposes of determining whether a quorum is present.

20. Minutes

Minutes shall be kept of all meetings of the TDA and a copy shall be provided to the Board of Commissioners.

Old Business - Navy Outlying Landing Field Update/Discussion

Attorney John Morrison clarified disturbing newspaper articles regarding Admiral Harvey meeting with individuals to discuss the OLF in Currituck County. It generated concern as to what Camden has been doing to resist the OLF. Attorney Morrison summed up what has been accomplished to date:

- It was not the Navy who selected Camden County but Governor Easley who put Camden on the Navy OLF list
- Board of Commissioners passed Resolutions in opposition
- Camden asked Currituck County, Pasquotank County and City of Elizabeth City to support Camden
- Consulted with Legislative Delegation Senator Marc Basnight and Representative Bill Owens and assured Camden their support
- The Governor's office was contacted and asked to take Camden off the list, unsuccessfully
- Poyner & Spruill was retained and actively engaged in educating regarding environmental law
- Formed a partnership with Currituck County recognizing mutual interest of opposition and they pay one half (1/2) of Poyner & Spruill and engineering fees
- Retained Withers & Ravenel that specialized in environmental impact engineering
- Withers & Ravenel conducted a public record study and found there is one and one half (1-1/2) foot minimum peat covering; additionally it is a coastal swamp area that is drained currently due to agriculture, but if agriculture is ceased, could revert to wetlands and cause significant problems
- The cost would be higher to build an OLF at Hales Lake because soil would have to be removed and filled back in
- Multiple visits to Raleigh and Washington, DC to consult with representatives and various agencies
- Retained French/West/Vaughn public relations firm to make sure the citizens were informed
- Supported and encouraged citizens groups who have performed extensive research
- Requested public records from NCDENR, Governor's Office, Lt. Governor's Office, Corp of Engineers
- Obtained support and aid of Senator Dole, Senator Hagan, Senator Burr, Congressman Jones, Congressman Butterfield, Senator Basnight, Representative Owens and Gates County delegation in the General Assembly
- Last year the North Carolina General Assembly unanimously passed a law changing Federal Onclave Statute in North Carolina, requires the US Navy to get permission to have exclusive jurisdiction over a military installation in North Carolina
- Obtained active opposition participation of various members of the Council of State
- Received a commitment from Superintendent of Public Instruction June Atkinson to come to Camden County in April to indicate how the OLF will damage Camden County students and school system
- Attorney General Cooper wrote a letter to Congressman Jones that was put on the Senate floor to the effect that he is aware of this issue and the law of the General Assembly and he will do what is necessary to protect the environment and citizens of Northeastern North Carolina.

Commissioner Michael McLain stated that Admiral Harvey should have consulted others, made public his appearance in Moyock and that a letter should be written to the Secretary of the Navy that the Admiral appears to be in violation of Senate Report 111-35 to the National Defense Authorization Act.
